### **International Keynote**

Mark Gilman is the Strategic Recovery Lead for Public Health in England, with extensive experience working in addiction, designing and developing recovery oriented systems of care for people with substance misuse problems in the

UK. Mark has been working with problem drug users since the days of the 'bad trip tents' at Free Festivals in the North West of England in the 1970s.

Christine Duncan MSW is the CEO of Scottish Families Affected by Alcohol and Drugs, and has lead several third sector organisations working to support children and families where a large number were impacted by substance

misuse. She currently sits on the National Naloxone Advisory Group and the National Forum for Drug Related Deaths in Scotland; is working with Edinburgh University on a study looking at the impact of substance misuse on families with specific reference to anxiety and depression; and is also part of another study with the Universities of Bath and Stirling to consider the impact of drug related deaths on families.

**Etty Matalon** is a Clinical Psychologist and is the National Clinical Training Manager for the National Cannabis Prevention and Information Centre (NCPIC) at UNSW. Etty has 25 years clinical experience in the alcohol and

other drug field having worked at two major teaching hospitals in Sydney; as the Clinical Co-ordinator for a women's detoxification service and as the Program Manager at a psychiatric hospital. Throughout her career she has worked closely with the National Drug and Alcohol Research Centre. Etty's role at NCPIC is to coordinate and disseminate best practice information and education and deliver training over a range of treatment interventions.
